# A Note From the Pastor...

Melech - Malach

January is a curious month. It is at the beginning of the year; the top of the calendar, sitting there like a king. It is also usually a month of bleak, dreary weather ... trying send us messages, to tell us things, like:

stay inside!

bundle up!

January IS a curious month.

As both king and messenger, January's duality reminds us of other things; like this is the month we celebrate Martin Luther King's birthday. His birthday is both seen as just an excuse for a January day off and/or as a deliberate way to honor King's legacy. I would vote for the latter, let me explain ...

The two words (yes, those are words!) at the beginning of my article are the Hebrew words (phonetically spelled out) for King and Messenger. They look similar, because many Hebrew words which share a relationship are based off of the same root word. In the ancient world, the King would send an announcement not as written, but in the person of a representative who would orally deliver his message. This representative with this task was known as a Messenger. The Messenger, delivering the announcement, was generally treated as if they were the King, as the words they bore came from that source. So, in many ways, the King and Messenger were equal!! find it a happy coincidence, that the consonants that are the root for these two Hebrew words is this:



and since the Hebrew was written from right to left, once we turn these around and use our alphabet it becomes:

Do you see what I've seen? MLK, Martin Luther King, was both a King and a Messenger! King by name, messenger of the Living God! His words challenging us all to live in the hope of a brighter future, where we all see each other with God's eyes, and not the skin-color-fixated people we are.

This is also a month beginning a year in which you will most likely also have a new Messenger in your midst. A new announcer of God's hope and love who will be delivered by the messengers of the Pastor Nominating Committee. We don't know how, when or who, at the moment. But the year is just beginning! Continue in prayer for the PNC's work to that end. Continue in prayer for the one who will answer their invitation to come. Continue in prayer for the Spirit's discernment in the congregation when it comes time to vote. God bless us all!



# Sharing God's Love

"Sharing God's Love" are action ideas on relating to children. You will be seeing them here in the Presby Record, in weekly emails, and in the Sunday bulletins. For me, sharing God's love is essential.

# January 5

In 1 Corinthians 13 we read that patience, kindness, acceptance and respect are some of the qualities we are to have. Is this just for co-workers and business people? Showing patience, kindness, acceptance and respect should not stop when we get home. Maybe you respect your supervisor; do you respect your brothers and sisters? Maybe you are patient with your students; are you patient with your elderly parents? You will not be respected if you do not respect others, including your own children! Your children will not respect other adults if you are not respectful of your spouse, your parents, and your neighbors. Family members are not made to be argued with, picked on, or to have their faults discussed over and over. Share God's love with your family through

respect, patience, and kindness.

"You are precious in my sight and I love you." This quote from Isaiah 43:4 blew me away. I had not really heard it out loud before! Right in the Bible, God said, "I love you." I learned this a year ago and I am still amazed. Many have heard of God's Grace, but had you heard the three little words before...from God? It is this love shared with us that gives us the ability to share it with everyone else. Go ahead, share God's love with "I love you," often, everywhere, and in abundance.

#### January 19

"Two of the greatest joys in life are the joy of being different from others and the joy of being the same as others." The first is the joy of being chosen, of achievement and rewards. The second is a little difficult. Henri M. Nouwen, who I quoted above, says in his book Our Greatest Gift that the second kind of joy is "of being a part of that vast variety of people-of all ages, colors, and religions-who together form the human family. This is the immense joy of being part of the human race." Nouwen says that when walking with thousands of people in Alabama in a civil rights march with Martin Luther King Jr. he felt as never before this joy. "In an instant, all differences seemed to melt away as snow in the sun." Check out this book, number 242.42 NOU, from the church library. Notice when you have joy. Which kind is it? Share God's love by embracing the joy of inclusion.

#### January 26

Sharing God's love sometimes includes sharing that love with yourself. It is hard to be a listener when your own need to speak freely has not been met. God wants you to speak and to be heard. This week pay attention to your need to be heard. Find a time, a place, and a person with whom you can speak. Maybe that person will share God's love with you by listening.

"And when they saw the star, they rejoiced exceedingly with great joy."

~ Matthew 2:10

While secular culture generally celebrates Christmas on a single day, with a bizarre focus on consumer consumption, the church celebrates the birth of Jesus for twelve days beginning on the anniversary of that silent night long ago in the city of David. The season of Christmas continues until January 6 each year when we celebrate the arrival of magi who recognized and worshiped the newborn king.

There was quite a mercantile hubbub then too, but not because the Prince of Peace was to be born. Imagine the vendors along every street, ready to sell you all you may need while waiting your turn to be counted and taxed. But yet there was no room available for weary travelers to rest, and gentle Mary gave birth surrounded by a menagerie, and lay her baby boy in the soft hay of their manger.

Sarah Bentley Allred, previously a children's and youth ministries director from High Point, North Carolina, is an MDiv. student at Virginia Theological Seminary. She writes, "The church celebrates Epiphany on January 6 each year, twelve days after Christmas Day. On Epiphany, we recall the arrival of the wise men to visit the newborn baby Jesus. The season of Epiphany stretches out from January 6 until the beginning of Lent. The season varies in length because the date of Easter changes yearly. Epiphany might be as long as nine weeks or as short as four weeks.

While the season of Epiphany does not get as much hype as the preceding seasons of Advent and Christmas, it is an important time of the church year nonetheless. After all the December celebrations die down, Epiphany reminds us that Christmas is just the beginning of the story."



She expounds on the details of the story that make the magi so remarkable. "First, the wise men are paying attention. They "observed his star at its rising" and realized it was a sign (Matt 2:2). Second, the wise men trust God's guidance. They leave their country and travel a great distance without knowing exactly where they are going. After finding the Christ child, the three kings are warned in a dream not to return to Herod and they diligently leave "for their own country by another road" (Matt 2:12). Third, the magi humbled themselves at the sight of an infant king in a manger, "they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage" (Matt 2:11). Despite the odd circumstances, a baby born to an unwed, un-wealthy mother in a barn, the magi presented Jesus with gifts fit for a king born under very different circumstances."

She continues, "This beautiful, odd story foretells the many ways Jesus' life will reverse worldly expectations. Despite how the Holy Family might appear to the townsfolk of Bethlehem, the magi's visit identifies Jesus as a king. Furthermore, the magi have crossed international borders. They come from a foreign country to mark Jesus as a king for all people."

May your advent observances have brought you to a joyous celebration of this Christmas season with loved ones near and far. If you are at home here in St.

Albans on December 29, join us after worship for a *Last Hurrah for Christmas* following worship. Bring your favorite star ornament and stories to share with others during brunch.

We all are innkeepers who must decide if we have room for Jesus.

Youth Day of Service is now the Intergenerational Day of Service

# THE PRESBY RECORD 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Feb. 1

The Intergenerational Day of Service is a day of service on Saturday, Feb. 1, that will be based in different parts of the presbytery: Bream Memorial Presbyterian Church, Charleston; First Presbyterian Church, Clarksburg, and Highlawn Presbyterian Church, Huntington. These are part of the Day of Service of Souper Bowl Sunday.

People ages 10 through adults from across the presbytery are encouraged to join together at the sites to participate in local mission in a variety of forms. You might find yourself at a food pantry, a clothes closet, or helping elderly people in their homes.

While the focus of the event will be the same in each area, with Opening and Closing Gatherings that are the same, the work sites and projects will vary. The day begins at 10 a.m. and ends at 2 p.m. All participants are asked to bring a bag lunch as lunch may be eaten at their work site.

There is no cost to participate, but in order to help those coordinating these events at the various sites, often with local agencies, pre-registration is vital. **Registration deadline is Thursday, Jan.**23. Those under 18 should be accompanied by an adult, who, if other than a parent with a youth participating, will need to complete a background check or have one on file at the Presbytery office. In addition, participants are asked to fill out a medical/emergency form and **bring it with them to the event**.

# Time to start thinking about 2020 Montreat Youth Conference

#### July 11-18, 2020

The 2020 Montreat Youth Conference will provide opportunities for youth in all our churches to connect with hundreds of high school youth from across the country to engage in faith conversations exploring who God is and who we are – those who God connects, calls, shapes, and empowers – through small groups, keynotes, worship and recreation. Rodger Nishioka will be the keynote presenter.

Youth currently in grades 8-12 are encouraged to participate in this high school summer conference. Space is limited, as the Presbytery only has room for 14 people, including adults. The cost per youth is \$350, with \$175

due at the time of registration, which is on a first-come, first-registered basis until either the registration deadline of April 30 or all 14 spaces are filled, whichever is first. This cost includes the conference fee, housing, transportation and most of the food during the week. We are also in need of two adults to attend, for whom Presbytery will cover costs.
